Subject to the availability of HAP funding, the City will provide \$1,250 for each member of an eligible household, up to a maximum of \$5,000 per household. She currently serves on Board that include Prince George's County Municipal Association Policy Chair, 2021-Present; Prince George's County Cable Television Commission, 2018-present; Census 2020 and Prince George's Complete Count Committee, Dementia Friendly America Team Member, 2016-present; City of District Heights 80th Anniversary Chair, 2016; Former President of the Prince George's County Municipal Association, 2018-2019; Maryland Municipal League Former Vice-President, District 9, 2018-2019. She continues to serve on the Committees for the Youth and Family Service Bureau, Youth Development Foundation, Planning Committee for the Veterans Park, Website Committee Chair and Senior Center Project for the City of District Heights. She currently serves on the Marlboro Pike Corridor Stakeholders Committee. The Committee is focusing on the revitalization of Marlboro Pike. This will be a huge investment and redevelopment project that will bring new businesses and a more upscaled look to the landscape of our community.

Mayor Miller continues to volunteer with her husband at Woodland Springs Apartment Complex as part of the Monthly Food Bank Program. Additionally, she tirelessly volunteers her time at Food 4Thought, food distribution program at St. Paul Church. Mayor Miller is currently in discussion with Food4Thought to bring a regular food program that include the residents. Mayor Cynthia Miller and husband, Cyril are long standing members of First Baptist Church of Highland Park in Landover, MD.

Hello, beautiful District Heights, neighbors, friends and supporters!

I would like to offer congratulations my dear colleague and friend, Mayor Cynthia Miller for her win to lead our community for the next four years. Wait till you see what she has up her sleeve for us!

Congratulations to Commissioners Elect Pamela Janifer and Anthony Tilghman. We welcome you, and hope that we can maintain the community's forward momentum towards a brighter and more prosperous future – TOGETHER!

These past few very busy weeks, I took advantage of the beautiful weather to knock on doors to check-in and listen to my neighbors. I wanted to better understand their concerns. I appreciate the many of you that opened the door and spoke to me. I also understand the apprehension of those that didn't, as we are still in the midst of a pandemic and there are so many scams going on, you just don't really know. Seeing me on Zoom is not quite the same as recognizing me knocking on your door!

Many of our neighbors shared with me concerns over safety and wanted information about the state of our current police department. I promised when I took this job, I would just tell you the truth. It is easier, and since I have no political aspirations outside of this community where I have planted roots and gratefully call home, I am not concerned about the "optics." I am gonna give it to you straight.

Our crime statistics are extremely low for the region (crime appears to be rising during the pandemic for multitude reasons). Our police department is going through a transformational change. Several officers that simply weren't a good fit for this community, or our City's finances (lawsuits and civil rights violations; productivity problems, etc.) have moved on. Some that the community loved, will be, gratefully, returning.



Those officers and staff that are here are committed and dedicated to serve this community in a respectful, professional, and community oriented manner.

If you have questions, please don't listen to the gossip, you may come to me, Mayor Miller, Vice Mayor Irving or Commissioners Gomez and Waters directly. We are in this together and truthful information is empowerment for a strong, informed and vibrant community.

As many know, we have been actively in the process of selecting our next permanent chief. We had received over 45 applications of interest, and whittled it down to the top 5 candidates. After very careful consideration to ensure that we have a Chief of Police that will compliment this community and be able to hire officers that aren't here to take advantage or over-police our community, the panel has made a recommendation.

COMMISSIONER HARCOURT

The number one recommendation was Ronald Tarpley. Chief Tarpley has accepted the role and offer, and will be working immediately to help us "reimagine policing" in District Heights and Prince George's County. Chief Tarpley brings a host of knowledge, skills, education and training to lead our Department to a new level of professional standards and ethics. He possesses the discipline and work ethic to get out from behind his desk and get into the community, working with his colleagues and the community as a partner and true leader.

Please join us as we welcome and congratulate a shining star to lead our community's most dedicated men and women, Chief Ronald Tarpley!

Chief Tarpley's first priority will be to hire qualified officers to join the team. Hiring a qualified police officer is not like hiring in other professions. As a former police officer, I assure you it requires patience to ensure that the person empowered to give you a warning, write you a ticket, or under certain grave circumstances, take a person's freedom or life, is beyond reproach, honest, and by the book.

Additionally, we are exploring new technology that will help protect our community and promote officer safety. We are going to rebuild this Department the right way, our collective lives depend on it.

A huge concern, by far, is speeding and reckless driving through our streets. The current speed limit for District Heights' residential streets is 25 mph. In many instances, because the streets are so narrow, it may require a lower speed. I am appealing to my neighbors directly - please slow down. Please practice a bit of empathy when driving through YOUR community, and ask, would you want visitors speeding through a community where your children played or your significant other and elderly parents walked? Many of our streets don't have sidewalks, and when you are walking, unprotected, the sight of a vehicle barreling down on you speeding, is not a good feeling.

So please, slow down and advise your guests to please slow down. It only takes a split second for a child chasing a ball, or an adventurous pet to be gone too soon, leaving a hole and trauma for all involved. Shaving a second or two off your arrival time just isn't worth it. Next issue, drug activity. I would like to thank the courageous residents that shared tips about suspected drug activity, and encourage more to do the same. I am also comforted to see so many residents that have alarms, surveillance, and video recording devices on their properties.

COMMISSIONER HARCOURT

This may prove helpful when we may need to build an investigation. Some of the main areas of suspected drug activity are:

- Automobile parked at the path on bottom of Gateway and Foster
- 7000 Block of Halleck and Mason

These areas have been reported to the Department and will be routinely surveilled. Why am I posting the locations? Because I want the dealers to know that this community is paying attention to its surroundings, and you are not welcome here. Dealing drugs brings a host of complimentary crime, from littering, noise pollution, property crimes and diminishing property values. It destabilizes communities, and we are on the move. We are not going backwards. Please take your business elsewhere.

The City can only be as responsive to concerns as the information we get. Please partner with us to make our community even better. Don't simply complain, take action and partner with the City! And finally, we need Chairpersons and volunteers for several committees – minimum 5 participants for a quorum:

- Holiday Decoration Committee
- District Heights Arts and Craft Fair Committee (I want this one!)
- Health and Hygiene Committee (will work on updating codes) will require a background in contracting; code enforcement; law; research; etc.
- Young Leaders Committee 13 through 18 year olds interested in politics; financial literacy; internships
- STEM (Science, Tech, Engineering, Math) for youth (ages to be determined by group)
- CAP (Citizens Action Patrol) Neighborhood Watch Be part of the community safety solution!
- Woodland Springs Tenant's Group




FIESTA PLACE COMMUNITY GARDEN
